The Divisions of French Catholicism, 1629-1641 2019 For much of the sixteenth-century, France was wracked by religious strife, as the Wars of Religion pitted Catholic against Protestant. Whilst the conversion of Henri IV to Catholicism ended much of the conflict, the ensuing peace highlighted the fractious nature of French Catholicism and the many competing threads that ran through it. This book investigates the gradual division of the French Catholic reform movement often associated with those known as the 'devots' during the first half of the seventeenth century. Such division was emerging before the publication in France (1641) of the posthumous 'Augustinus' of Jansenius, not simply as a result of that. Those who were already distinguishing themselves from other 'devots' before that date were thus not yet 'Jansenists'. Rather, the initial defining sentiment was increasing French hostility towards Jesuit involvement in Catholic Reform, both at home and abroad. Drawing on sources from the Jesuit archives in Rome and on Port-Royal materials in Paris, the book begins with an investigation into the development of Catholic Reform in France, showing the problems that emerged before 1629 and the degree to which these were or were not resolved. The second half of the book covers the fragmentation of the movement in the years beyond 1629, and the context of Richelieu's new directions in French foreign policy. Covering a crucial period in the lead up to the establishment of an absolute monarchy in France, this book offers a rich new explanation of the development of French political and ecclesiastical history. It will be of interest not only to those studying the early modern period, but to anyone wishing to understand the roots of French secular society.

The Parting of the Ways May 21 2022 This book seeks to inject into the general discussion of the "Parting of the Ways" between Judaism and Christianity the social realities of the separation of a particular Christian community and a particular Jewish community. By drawing upon the literary and the historical data available concerning the church in Rome, Spence and others discover when and how Christians came to see themselves as an identifiably distinct community. His findings will challenge those who see the "Parting of the Ways" as a slow process. He argues that although the "parting" was early, it was not without its complications. Drawing upon the work of Rodney Stark, a sociologist of religion, Spence suggests that in the church in Rome there was a struggle between those who saw the church as a Jewish sect and those who saw it as a Roman cult - a struggle already underway when the Apostle Paul wrote Romans. This struggle, however, was not the one, because it was the cultists, those for whom the church's primary social location was the pagans of Rome, who held positions of power over the numerically smaller sectarians who sought to maintain the church's primary identity as a Jewish sect acceptable within the synagogues of Rome.

Parting the Mists Oct 02 2020 In *Parting the Mists*, Aida Yuen Wong makes a convincing argument that the forging of a national tradition in modern China was frequently pursued in association with rather than in rejection of Japan. Her book is on Japan's integral role in the invention of "national-style painting," or guohua, in early-twentieth-century China. Guohua, referring to brush paintings on traditional formats, is often misconstrued as a residual conservative art form of a dynastic age that barricaded itself within classical traditions. Wong places this art form at the forefront of cross-cultural exchange. Notable proponents of guohua (e.g., Chen Hengke, Jin Cheng, Fu Baoshi, and Gao Jianfu) are discussed in connection with Japan, where they discovered stylistic and ideological paradigms consonant with the empowering "Asian/Oriental" cultural practices against the backdrop of encroaching westernization. Not just a "window on the world," Japan stood as an informant of China modernism in its own right. The first book in English devoted to Sino-Japanese dialogues in modern art, *Parting the Mists* explores the sensitive phenomenon of Japanism in the practice and theory of Chinese painting. Wong carries out a methodologically agile study that sheds light on multiple spheres: stylistic and iconographic innovations, history writing, art theory, patronage and the market, geopolitics, the creation of artists and exhibitions. Without avoiding the dark history of Japanese imperialism, she provides a nuanced reading of China's relationship about Japan and the two countries' convergent, and often colliding, courses of nationalism.

The Parting of the Sea Sep 11 2021 For more than four decades, biblical experts have tried to place the story of Exodus in its historical context--without success. What could explain the Nile turning to blood, insects swarming the land, and darkness falling to darkness? Integrating biblical accounts with substantive archaeological evidence, *The Parting of the Sea* shows how natural phenomena shaped the stories of Exodus, the Sojourn in the Wilderness, and the Israelite conquest of Canaan. Barbara Sivertsen demonstrates that the Exodus was in fact two separate exoduses both triggered by volcanic eruptions. She provides scientific explanations for the ten plagues and the parting of the Red Sea. Over time, Israelite oral tradition combined these events into the Exodus narrative known today. Skillfully unifying textual and archaeological records with details of ancient geological events, Sivertsen shows how the first exodus followed a 1628 B.C.E Minoan eruption that produced all but one of the first nine plagues. The second exodus followed an eruption of a volcano off the Aegean coast.

Yali almost two centuries later, creating the tenth plague of darkness and a series of tsunamis that "parted the sea" and drowned the pursuing Egyptian army. Sivertsen's brilliant account explains inconsistencies in the biblical story, fits it chronologically with the conquest of Jericho, and confirms that the Israelites were in Canaan before the end of the second millennium B.C.E. In examining oral traditions and how these practices absorb and process geological details through storytelling, *The Parting of the Sea* reveals how powerful historical narratives are transformed into myth.

Parting Ways Jan 05 2021 Judith Butler follows Edward Said's late suggestion that through a consideration of Palestinian dispossession in relation to Jewish diasporic traditions a new ethos can be forged for a one-state solution. Butler draws on Jewish philosophical positions to articulate a critique of political Zionism and its practices of illegitimate state violence, nationalism, and state-sponsored racism. At the same time, she moves beyond communitarian frameworks, including binationalism, that fail to arrive at a radical democratic notion of political cohabitation. Butler engages thinkers such as Edward Said, Emmanuel Levinas, Hannah Arendt, Primo Levi, Martin Buber, Walter Benjamin, and Mahmoud Darwish as she articulates a new political ethic. In her view, it is as important to dispute Israel's claim to represent the Jewish people as to show that a narrowly Jewish framework cannot suffice as a basis for an ultimate critique of Zionism. She proposes an ethical position in which the obligations of cohabitation do not derive from cultural sameness but from the unchangeable character of social plurality. Recovering the arguments of Jewish thinkers who offered criticisms of Zionism or violence could be used for such a purpose, Butler disputes the specific charge of anti-Semitic self-hatred often leveled against critics of Israel. Her political ethic relies on a vision of cohabitation that thinks anew about binationalism and the limits of a communitarian framework to overcome the colonial legacy of Zionism. Her own engagements with Edward Said and Mahmoud Darwish form an important point of departure and conclusion for her engagement with some key concepts of thought derived in part from Jewish resources, but always in relation to the non-Jew. Butler considers the rights of the dispossessed, the necessity of plural cohabitation, and the dangers of arbitrary state violence, showing how these ideas are extended to a critique of Zionism, even when that is not their explicit aim. She revisits and affirms Edward Said's proposals for a one-state solution within the ethos of binationalism. Butler's startling suggestion: Jewish ethics and politics demand a critique of Zionism, but must transcend its exclusive Jewishness in order to realize the ethical and political goals of living together in radical democracy.
